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## Section 1: Overview

**Note:** This manual specifically describes the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> IC755CxS06RDx, IC755CxWxxCDx and IC755CxSxxCDx display units.

The QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Operator Interface is an all-in-one micro-computer designed for maximum flexibility. The design is based on an Advanced RISC Machine (ARM) core micro-processor to combine a high-resolution touchscreen operator interface with a variety of communications options. Users can connect to most industrial equipment using the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> communications ports.

The QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> is equipped with several memory types to satisfy the most demanding applications. A section of Dynamic Random Access Memory (DRAM) is split between the operating system, an object store, and application memory. Additionally, a section of Nonvolatile Random Access Flash Memory (NOVRAM), functioning as a virtual hard drive, is divided between the operating system and persistent storage for application programs. Retentive memory is a battery-backed Static Random Access Memory (SRAM) to store and protect data during a power failure.

Figure 2: 4-Sided View of IC755CxS06RDx




Figure 3: Rear View & Dimensions IC755CxS06RDx




Figure 4: 4-Sided View IC755CxW07CDx





Figure 5: Rear View IC755CxW07CDx

Figure 6: 4-Sided View IC755CxS10CDx





Figure 7: Rear View IC755CxS10CDx

Figure 8: 4-Sided View IC755CxS12CDx





Figure 9: Rear View IC755CxS12CDx

Figure 10: 4-Sided View IC755CxS15CDx







Figure 11: Rear View IC755CxS15CDx

## Section 3: Software

This Section provides QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> software information and procedures to perform the most common tasks.

## 3.1 Operating System

**Note:** Refer to http://windows.microsoft.com.

The QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> operating system (OS), Microsoft Windows Embedded Compact 7, is a full 32-bit OS with a graphical user interface (GUI). It is stored in flash memory and copied to a block of DRAM for execution. The OS automatically starts following QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> unit powerup or reset.

## 3.2 Backup Utility

#### **NOTICE**

• Run the Backup Utility after configuration changes to the operating system, after installing applications, and before shutdown.

The QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> is not battery powered; therefore, a Backup Utility feature saves the changes made to the Windows Registry or Desktop to Flash Memory. The Backup Utility achieves the following:

- Stores the Windows Embedded Compact 7 registry (including any control panel settings) in Flash memory
- Stores changes (or additions) made to the \Windows sub-tree of the file system in the user block of flash memory

### 3.3 Storage Manager

**Note:** Storage Manager is accessed from the Control Panel folder. Online help is available.

Use Microsoft Storage Manager to repair or format lost or corrupted data volumes existing in the SD Card, battery-backed SRAM (BBSRAM), or USB Flash Keys (thumb drives).

**Note:** Data volumes existing in the main flash file system of the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> may not be repaired by Storage Manager.

## 3.4 Copy Project to SD Card

The custom utility Copy Project to SD Card transfers PAC Machine Edition View and Control projects between compatible QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> units using SD cards.

### **ACAUTION**

Before disconnecting power, verify that the copy or update operation is complete (no busy message or wait cursor).

#### To copy a PAC Machine Edition project to an SD card

- 1. Verify that there is a blank SD card in the SD card port.
- 2. Double-tap the **Copy Project to SD Card** icon on the desktop.
- If the project is secured with an enhanced security password, then the password authentication window will be displayed. The user shall be able to proceed only when the password is successfully authenticated.
- 4. From the Copy Project Query confirmation window, tap Yes.

### **ACAUTION**

Copying a project while PAC Machine Edition runtimes are active may cause an incomplete copy to be created if the runtimes are also writing to files in the project folders. If the utility detects this situation, it will notify you to stop the runtimes before making the backup. You will not be able to create a backup while the runtimes are writing files.

## 3.5 PAC Machine Edition Project Update

Update a PAC Machine Edition application that is currently stored on the QuickPanel<sup>†</sup> unit with a revision stored on a flash device, such as an SD card.

#### To update a Machine Edition project

- 1. Insert the flash device containing an upgraded version of the PAC Machine Edition project into the appropriate port.
- 2. Restart the unit.

**Note:** Depending on set options, the update may or may not be enabled, or may update automatically. If there is more than one flash device with a valid project copy present, a Select Media confirmation window displays, prompting you to choose with which flash device to update Select the device from the list and click **OK** to continue. When a valid project is found on the flash device, you will be prompted to install the project or skip it. Tap **OK** to install or **Cancel** to skip the installation, and continue to restart. If an invalid project is found, an error message displays. This window must be closed before the unit will restart.

3. Remove the flash device from the port.

### 3.6 FTP Server

The File Transfer Protocol (FTP) server included with the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> unit supports standards (RFC 959). It does not support Secure File Transfer Protocol (SFTP) or implicit FTPS, which uses different ports and is based on Secure Shell (SSH) rather than Secure Sockets Layer (SSL).

The FTP server is configured with the Quick Panel<sup>+</sup> Setup Tool. By default, the server is not enabled. Once enabled, a background program will run, waiting for clients to connect. Up to ten connections are supported. Sessions that are idle for five minutes are terminated by the server.

The server supports the non-secure operation. All information including username, password, and data is transmitted with no encryption and is susceptible to packet sniffing and various FTP attacks.

**Note:** If the server status is changed, the QuickPanel $^{+}$  must be restarted before changes take effect.

### 3.6.1 Remote User Authentication

**Note:** The FTP root directory is available from the QuickPanel\* as \, and is the root of the flash device.

The server only supports anonymous login with a password requested (but not validated). This may prevent some types of attacks and is required by some clients. Once connected, the remote user is logged into the FTP root directory.

### 3.6.2 FTP with Removable Flash Devices

All removable flash devices remote-FTP users as directories of the FTP root directory. Computer Flash card partitions display as directories such as \SD Memory and USB Flash Keys display as directories such as \Hard Disk. Full access privileges are granted to the client in these folders/devices.

Removable flash device directories are captured when a session is opened and are not changed while the session exists. If you start without an installed SD Card, close your session and log on again to view the SD Card directory. If the SD Card existed when you logged on and is removed and inserted, it will still work, provided the SD Card's device name did not change during reinsertion.

### 3.7 HTTP Server

The HyperText Transfer Protocol (HTTP) server included with the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> supports standards (RFC 2616). The HTTP server is configured with the Quick Panel<sup>+</sup> Setup Tool. By default, the server is not enabled. Once enabled, a background program will run, waiting for clients to connect. From the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Operator Interface, the default web page is located in \Windows\www\wwwpub.

The server supports non-secure port 80 operations. QP<sup>+</sup> can have a maximum of 16 (unique IP addresses) web connections and "n" number of clients (web browser). If the application contains more objects then the load time for the web pages will increase, degrading performance.

**Note:** If the server status is changed, the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> must be restarted before changes take effect.

### 3.8 SNTP Server

The SNTP server included with the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> supports SNTP Version 4 for IPv4, IPv6, and OSI. The SNTP server is configured with the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Setup Tool. By default, the server is not enabled. Once enabled, the server will refresh the time specified in the setup tool configuration. Pressing the Update Now button immediately obtains the time from the configured time server.

The SNTP server supports non-secure UDP port 123 operations.

## 3.9 QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> OS Utilities Settings Tool

**Note:** DIP switches are set in the OFF position (default) at the factory.

The QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Operator Interface is equipped with DIP switches to perform control functionality, as follows:

- DIP Switch 1 (SW2 Switch) enables firmware upgrades. The firmware upgrade is allowed only after turning this switch in the ON position. It is highly recommended to turn the switch position to OFF after the firmware upgrade is completed as a security measurement.
- **DIP Switch 2 (SW2 Switch)** controls Force Startup. Turning this switch to the ON position forces the startup applications to run when the operating system is started.

**Note:** The DIP Switch feature is designed as a security measurement. However, security requirements can also be met using the gesture-based feature. Before the listed firmware builds, these operations were only supported using the DIP Switch settings.

Some operators find it difficult to use the DIP Switch settings to perform these functions (such as removing the back plate of the device and adjusting the positions of the DIP Switch for each operation). As an alternative to using the DIP Switch settings, the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> OS Utilities Settings tool contains finger gesture-based utilities to perform the same operations. This functionality is available with the firmware builds listed in the following table.

The tool operation buttons for each utility only respond to a double-tap finger gesture. It will not accept any keyboard or mouse clicks, finger simulator-based inputs, or click inputs from any remote touch-based device. The user can access the tool from the **Start** menu by selecting **Programs, System**, and **QuickPanel** OS **Utilities Settings** on the device. The tool

can be used to perform the following operations using the double-tap feature, without adjusting the DIP Switch positions:

- Section 3.9.1, Firmware Upgrade
- Section 3.9.2, Bypass Startup Programs
- Section 3.9.3, Reset Enhanced Security
- Section 3.9.4, Enable or Disable SNMP Agent

#### **NOTICE**

• For security, permit these operations only when the operator is physically located near the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> and require that users perform a physical action on the device.

### 3.9.1 Firmware Upgrade

Note:

This utility operates similarly to the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Update Tool, which comes with the OS image upgrade binaries. The operator can continue to use the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Update Tool to use the DIP Switch feature.

The Firmware Upgrade utility setting enables operators to upgrade the firmware. Firmware updates are not supported over Ethernet or Serial interfaces. Insert the media (SD Card) containing the required files for firmware upgrade and perform the following procedure.

#### Note:

- Make sure the copy of the required binaries to the SD card is not within a folder.
- The firmware package contains encrypted .nbo files. Use the PreUpdate.exe tool to decrypt the .nbo files before using them to upgrade.

After a firmware upgrade, which refreshes the device, the user must download the project again and install their tools (including third-party tools) on the device.

Note:

It is recommended that the user back up any important data before firmware upgrade so that they can replace the data after firmware upgrade if necessary.



#### To perform a firmware upgrade

- From the Start menu, select Programs, System, and QuickPanel\* OS Utilities Settings
   Tool to display the QuickPanel\* OS Utilities Settings window.
- 2. Upgrade the firmware.

- 4. Download the project and install any site-specific tools, including third-party tools, on the device.

- 3. Perform the firmware upgrade.


Figure 13: Firmware Upgrade Sequence for Specific Firmware Builds

### 3.9.2 Bypass Startup Programs

**Note:** This utility functions the same as disabling or enabling the **Don't startup Program** functionality using DIP Switch Position 2.

The Bypass Startup Programs utility enables the operator to choose the gesture-based feature or DIP Switch (Use DIP Switch) feature to perform the Force Startup operation.

To bypass startup programs and force startup

- From the Start menu, select Programs, System, and QuickPanel\* OS Utilities Settings

Figure 15: Activate Checkbox for Use DIP Switch




Figure 16: Enable Bypass Sequence




Figure 17: Start-Up Window following Enable





Figure 18: Start-Up Window following Disable



If the **Use DIP Switch** checkbox has been selected, **don't run Startup Programs** displays on the startup window based on the position of DIP Switch 2.

### 3.9.3 Reset Enhanced Security

The QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Operator Interface is configured using the PAC Machine Edition application. Using the PAC Machine Edition Enhanced Security feature, users can specify password protection for any network-connected QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> device to perform certain operations, such as the download operation. Every operation to connect to the device requires a password.


If you forget or do not know your password, the Reset Enhanced Security feature enables a QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> configuration download on the device by permitting the user to disable the Enhanced Security feature using the double-tap feature.

**Note:** Before support of the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> OS Utilities Settings Tool, if the user forgot, or did not know, his/her password, the only resolution was to contact Technical Support to reset the password or upgrade the firmware on the device.

#### To disable Enhanced Security

- From the Start menu, select Programs, System, and QuickPanel\* OS Utilities Settings
   Tool to display the QuickPanel\* OS Utilities Settings window.
- 2. Disable the Enhanced Security setting.

### 3.9.4 Enable or Disable SNMP Agent

The QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Operator Interface can be enabled as a Simple Network Management Protocol (SNMP) Agent with the capability to communicate with SNMP Managers for notification of Traps and responding to Query HMI Tag values.

Since it is designed to run over a public network, SNMP communication is disabled by default on the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> device for security reasons. As a security measure, the SNMP feature requires a tactile input gesture to enable and disable SNMP communication.

#### Note:

- Refer to the section Simple Network Management Protocol (SNMP) for further details.
- Enabling or disabling SNMP communication is a one-time user configuration.

#### To enable the SNMP Agent

- From the Start menu, select Programs, System, and QuickPanel\* OS Utilities Settings
   Tool to display the QuickPanel\* OS Utilities Settings window.
- 2. Enable SNMP communication.

Figure 20: Sequence to Enable SNMP




Figure 21: Acknowledge SNMP Security Risk Notice



### 3.10 Display Screen Sensitivity Tool

The QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> 7", 10", 12", and 15" display units use capacitive screen technology that is far more responsive than the previously used resistive touchscreen technology. Resistive screens required the operator to firmly press down on the resistive overlay for a response. Capacitive screens rely on the capacitive properties of the operator's finger pressing lightly on the screen.

If the operator is wearing gloves, this can affect the operation of the capacitive screens. The thickness of the glove keeps the operator's finger slightly further from the screen. To accommodate gloved operation, the Sensitivity Tool allows the screen sensitivity to be set to a higher level. Setting the screen sensitivity to **High** enables the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> display screen to operate with the user wearing most types of work gloves. For thicker gloves, the user may need to press down more firmly to place the finger closer to the screen, which causes the finger pad to spread out slightly to make a larger capacitive area.


**Note:** Gloved operation works best when the operator is wearing gloves that fit. If the fingers do not extend to the end of the glove, the empty space at the fingertip may make it difficult to operate the display screen while wearing gloves.

Setting the screen sensitivity to **Low** enables the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> operator actions to be slow and deliberate as they were using resistive screens. With low sensitivity, the operator must press firmly down on the display screen for a response.

#### To modify the Sensitivity Tool

- 1. From the **Start** menu, select **Programs, System**, and **Sensitivity Tool** to display the Sensitivity Setting window.
- 2. Set the sensitivity level.

Figure 24: Launch Application from Start Menu





Figure 25: Select or Browse to Specific Application



## 3.12 VNC Server


The VNC Server enables remote, visual connectivity to the QuickPanel<sup>†</sup> Operator Interface from a laptop computer or a mobile device through the remote VNC Viewers. User authentication of the VNC Server in the QuickPanel<sup>†</sup> is determined by the configuration of the Enhanced Security feature on the device. If the Enhanced Security feature is enabled for the device, a VNC Viewer can connect to the QuickPanel<sup>†</sup> on the VNC Server. Connection is dependent upon user authentication with the correct password. User password entry is validated with the Enhanced Security password. If the Enhanced Security feature is disabled for the device, the VNC Server does not enforce authentication of VNC Viewers.

The VNC Server is automatically launched during QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> startup. It can also be launched manually from the Launch Application.

**Note:** Only One VNC client can connect to VNC Server on  $QP^+$ . 5900 is the TCP/IP port on which the VNC server will accept connections.

To manually launch the VNC Server: from the Start menu, select Programs, System, Launch Application and start the VNC Server application.

Figure 26: Select QP<sup>+</sup> VNC Server Application




**Note:** The VNC server starts approximately 40 seconds after the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> start-up process has been completed.

# 3.13 Battery Life Prediction

The QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Operator Interface provides an estimated lifespan of the battery in the device. To display the battery life prediction, the current time on the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> device must be set. If a battery is not present, the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> BatteryStatus tab cannot provide battery life prediction.

To display the battery life prediction: from the Start menu, select System, open the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Setup tool and select the BatteryStatus tab.

Figure 27: Battery Life Prediction Example





Figure 28: Current Time Not Set Message





Figure 29: Example of Battery Life Prediction Displayed After Current Time Set









Figure 35: Battery Life Prediction Example after Battery Replacement



# 3.14 Simple Network Management Protocol (SNMP)


The SNMP is an application—layer protocol defined by the Internet Architecture Board (IAB) in RFC1157 that is used for exchanging management information between network devices. It is a part of the Transmission Control Protocol/Internet Protocol (TCP/IP) suite.

The QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Operator Interface is enabled as an SNMP agent with the capability to communicate with SNMP Managers (software tools run independently and are not part of QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Operator Interface) for the following purposes:

- Send notification of HMI Alarms as Traps
- Provide live values for SNMP Manager's GET/GETNEXT Query calls for HMI Tags

Figure 36 illustrates the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> operating as the SNMP Agent to communicate with an SNMP Manager for Traps notification and responding to Query HMI Tag values.

## QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Management Information Base (MIB) Overview

The QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> SNMP Agent maintains a MIB that describes the managed device parameters like HMI Tags, alarms, and such. The SNMP Manager uses the MIB to request specific information for the SNMP Agent and translates the information as needed for the SNMP Managers or Network Management System (NMS).

The MIB is a collection of information for managing network elements. It is a plain text file, self-explanatory, and prepared based on the Structure of Management Information (SMI), an adapted subset of Abstract Syntax Notation One (ASN.1) standard and notation.

#### **NOTICE**


 The QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> MIB follows the SNMP V2c and is also compatible with SNMP V1 based on the strictness of MIB compilers supported by SNMP Managers.

The MIB is comprised of managed objects identified as Object Identifier (Object ID or OID). Each Identifier is unique and denotes specific characteristics of a managed device. When queried, the return value of each identifier may be different. Figure 37 displays the MIB tree structure and the private enterprise number allocated by the Internet Assigned Numbers Authority (IANA) for the EMERSON SNMP products and OID for the QuickPanel<sup>†</sup> MIB:

#### **NOTICE**

It is highly recommended that you pre-load MIBs (GEIP-SMI.txt and GEIP-PRODUCTS-MIB.txt in sequence) before loading the QuickPanelMIB.mib file into SNMP Managers to avoid any MIB compiler errors.

Download the MIBs GEIP-SMI.txt and GEIP-PRODUCTS-MIB.txt from the Support Site. QuickPanelMIB.mib may be copied from the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> device by performing the procedure Export MIB to SD Card.

Figure 38 displays the HMI Alarms notification (TRAP information) with alarm objects as part of the Alarm Record. The SNMP Manager is notified with the TRAP information when alarms are generated on the HMI running on a QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> device.

**Figure 38: Alarm Trap Notification Display** 






# 3.14.1 Configure Trap Destinations

TRAP Destinations are configured through the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Setup Tool by providing the IP Address of the SNMP Manager to which Traps should be sent. The user can configure two different Trap Destinations (IP Addresses).

**Note:** If you do not want to be notified of Traps, you do not need to configure Trap Destinations.

#### To configure Trap Destinations

#### **NOTICE**

- If Trap Destination(s) is/are configured after enabling the SNMP Agent on the device, it is highly recommended that you subsequently disable and then re-enable the SNMP Agent service on the device.
- 1. From the **Start** menu, select **System**, open the **QuickPanel**<sup>+</sup> **Setup Tool**, and select the **SNMP Agent** tab.

# 3.14.2 Enable or Disable SNMP Agent

SNMP communication is disabled by default on the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> device for security purposes. To enable or disable SNMP communication using the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> OS Utilities Settings tool refer to the procedure in Section 3.9.4, Enable or Disable SNMP Agent.

**Note:** Enabling or disabling SNMP communication is a one-time user configuration.

# 3.14.3 Export MIB to SD Card

With the SNMP Agent enabled on the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> device, export the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Management Information Base (MIB) QuickPanelMIB.mib file to an SD Card.


#### **NOTICE**

- It is highly recommended that you pre-load Emerson MIBs (GEIP-SMI.txt and GEIP-PRODUCTS-MIB.txt in sequence) before loading the QuickPanelMIB.mib file into SNMP Managers to avoid any MIB compiler errors.
- Download the MIBs GEIP-SMI.txt and GEIP-PRODUCTS-MIB.txt from the Support Site.


# 3.14.4 Load MIB into SNMP Manager

After successfully exporting the MIB to an SD Card, archive the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> MIB file to a folder on a machine running with SNMP Manager.

# 3.14.5 Data Types Mapping between PAC Machine Edition Project and SNMP

When you configure HMI tags in a PAC Machine Edition project and you would like to use them in SNMP communication, all of the HMI tags are mapped to the corresponding data type in SNMP as listed in the following table. To verify this, review the Sequence of HMI Tags object in the MIB file.

PAC Machine Edition VIEW Data Types	SNMP Data Types
BOOL	INTEGER
DINT	INTEGER
LREAL	DISPLAYSTRING
STRING	DISPLAYSTRING

**Note:** The PAC Machine Edition VIEW LREAL data type is mapped to DISPLAYSTRING to retain the data intact.

You can continue to use the data type override/suffix mechanism in PAC Machine Edition for the LREAL data type to represent an INT/DINT if you have configured the data type for driver variables. This enables you to map to the DISPLAYSTRING data type in the SNMP communication as well.

For example, for the Emerson SRTP driver, you can override the IO Address of the LREAL variable LREALVar data type as %R100 [INT]. This maps the LREALVar to DISPLAYSTRING in the MIB file.

### 3.14.6 Establish SNMP Communication

#### **NOTICE**

 SNMP communication requires that both the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> device and the SNMP Manager running on a machine are connected on a valid Ethernet network.

#### To establish SNMP communication with the QuickPanel\* device

- Download the Project to the network-connected QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> device and start Runtime.
- 2. Configure the Trap Destinations with the IP Address of the SNMP Manager.

**Note:** If you do not want to be notified of Traps, you do not need to configure Trap Destinations.

- 3. Enable ab SNMP agent.
- 4. Export the MIB to an SD Card.
- 5. Auto-discover or connect the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> SNMP Agent from the SNMP Manager. Once connected, load the MIB to the SNMP Manager tool.

The SNMP Manager communicating with the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> device can query values for HMI Tags and receive Alarms/Trap notification from the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> device operating as an SNMP Agent.

#### Tip


If you get out of sequence in the steps for configuring Traps and starting the SNMP service to establish the SNMP communication, enable or disable the SNMP Agent again using the QuickPanel<sup>†</sup> OS Utilities Setting tool.

# 3.15 ScreenSaver

QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> can run a video as a screensaver. The configuration for this can be done at the ScreenSaver Tab in the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Setup Tool window.

Note: ScreenSaver is not supported on QP<sup>+</sup> 6" Inch and 7" Inch.

# 4.1 Unpacking and Inspection

Upon receipt of the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Operator Interface, carefully inspect all shipping containers for damage. If any part of the system is damaged, notify the carrier immediately. Save the damaged shipping container for inspection by the carrier. It is the consignee's responsibility to register a claim with the carrier for damage incurred during shipment.

**Note:** For phone numbers and email addresses, refer to the section Contact Information at the start of this manual.

After unpacking the unit, **record all serial numbers.** These are needed to contact Customer Care during the warranty period. Save all shipping containers and packing material for future transport or shipping. Verify that all system components have been received and agree with the order. If the system received does not agree with your order, contact Customer Care.

Before initial power-up, inspect the unit for loose or damaged components. If damage is found (such as bent component leads or loose components), contact Emerson Automation & Controls for additional instructions.

### **ACAUTION**

Do not apply power to the unit if it has visible damage. Applying power to a unit with damaged components may cause additional damage.

# 4.2 Basic Set-up


The QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Operator Interface is shipped ready for use after initial configuration.

To power up the unit, connect a dc power supply using the supplied quick-connect plug. Depending on the application, you may also want to connect and configure optional input devices, communications ports, and expansion adapters.

#### **WARNING**

- To avoid personal injury or damage to equipment, ensure that the dc supply is disconnected from power and the leads are not energized before attaching them to the unit's power supply input.
- If this equipment is used in a manner not specified by the manufacturer, equipment protection may be impaired.

# 4.3 Initial Start-up

You will need the following:

- Safety Extra Low Voltage (SELV) and Limited Energy Circuit or SELV and Class 2 dc power supply.
- The power terminal block is supplied with the product. For voltage and requirements, refer to the Input Power specifications for each product in Section 1.1, Specifications.
- The mating power terminal block supports stranded 30 to 14 AWG (0.05 to 2.00 mm2) wires. The user calculates proper gauge wiring for current carrying capacity and loss according to local regulations.
- At a minimum, the cable must be rated for 75°C (167°F), or more.
- USB-compatible keyboard (optional)
- USB-compatible mouse (optional)


# 4.3.1 Connecting Input Power

#### To connect input power:

- 1. Verify that the power cable is not energized.
- 2. Loosen the screw clamps on the mating power connector.
- 3. Strip the insulation from the power cables.
- 4. Secure the power cable to the mating connector, noting polarity, and tighten the screw clamps. The torque for the attaching screws is 0.3 Nm (2.66 in-lb).
- 5. Apply dc power to the unit. During normal startup and operation, the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> status LED indicator displays as follows:
- Solid amber while the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> is starting up
- Solid green during normal operation

6. Once power is applied, the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> begins initializing. The splash screen is the initial display.



# 4.4 Runtime Set-up

To download an application to a QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Operator Interface, set up a data link between the unit and the development workstation. Refer to Section 5.7.2, Ethernet for IC755CxS06RDx, IC755CxW07CDx, and IC755CxSxxCDx, and the PAC Machine Edition online help, Downloading a Machine Edition Project.

# 4.5 Firmware Updates

Update the unit to the most recently released version of the firmware, with the latest feature upgrades and issues addressed. Firmware updates for the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> are available on the Support website.

# 4.6 Shutdown

There are no specific dangers associated with a power failure or other unplanned shutdown of the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> unit. In general, programs are retained in flash memory and user data can be retained in BBSRAM. Some operating system settings are retained only with user intervention. Perform the following procedure to properly shut down the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> unit.

#### To shut down the QuickPanel\* unit

- 1. Quit any programs that are running and wait for all file operations to complete.
- 2. If you have not changed operating system settings (for example, brightness or touchscreen sensitivity), or do not want to save the changes, remove ac power from the dc supply.
- 3. Run the Backup Utility to save changes to operating system settings. When the Backup window displays Completed Successfully, remove power from the dc power supply connected to the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> unit.

## 5.1 Protective Sheet Installation

#### To install the protective sheet


- 1. Remove the protective film from the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> display screen.
- 2. Wipe the display unit for any dust or fingerprints.
- 3. Peel back a corner of the clear side of the protective sheet.
- 4. Begin applying the corner to the display screen.
- 5. Slowly apply the rest of the protective sheet, smoothing it out as you go.
- 6. Peel the green curing film from the protective sheet.

# **5.2** Mounting Location

**Note:** Refer to Section 1.1.2, Environmental Specifications.

When mounting the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Operator Interface, make sure the mounting area allows room to insert and remove the SD card, cables, and mounting brackets. Select a location that allows natural convection airflow from bottom to top of the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> enclosure. Do not mount the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> at an angle above 30° to the vertical, as illustrated in the following figure.

Figure 49: Mount within 30 Degrees to Vertical





Figure 50: Mounting Holes (top & bottom edges) IC755CxS06RDx






Figure 51: Mounting Holes (top & bottom edges) IC755CxW07CDx







Figure 52: Mounting Holes (top & bottom edges) IC755CxS10CDx

Figure 53: Mounting Holes (all four edges) IC755CxS12CDx





Figure 54: Mounting Holes (all four edges) IC755CxS15CDx



# 5.4 Mounting and Installation Procedure

Observe the following guidelines to properly mount and install the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Operator Interface:

**Note:** To order replacement gaskets, refer to the part number listed in Appendix B.

- The enclosure should be of metal material.
- The metal enclosure panel should ensure proper thickness and rigidity suitable to minimize impact to the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> unit.
- The recommended torque for the plastic back cover and interior metal cover for the 10, 12, and 15" QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> display units that are accessed for panel updates and serial port DIP Switches is 0.5 Nm (4.4 in-lb).

• To avoid gasket degradation, limit repeated insertions or removals of the unit and retightening of the mounting clips. For full protection, always use a fresh gasket.

• The unit will not fit through the cutout with any cables connected, or with the power supply plug inserted in the socket.

### **ACAUTION**

When installing the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> into the panel, pay careful attention while handling the unit so it does not drop and damage the unit.

Figure 55: Panel Cutout Dimensions IC755CxS06RDx or IC755CxW07CDx




Figure 56: Panel Cutout Dimensions IC755CxS10CDx




Figure 57: Panel Cutout Dimensions IC755CxS12CDx






Figure 58: Panel Cutout Dimensions IC755CxS15CDx





Figure 59: Insert QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> into Mounting Panel Cutout





# 5.5 VESA Arm Mounting





Figure 63: VESA Mounting Holes IC755CxSxxCDx

**To VESA mount the QuickPanel** unit: use the mounting holes located on the back of the unit (refer to Figure 62 and Figure 63).

Figure 62: VESA Mounting Holes IC755CxW07CDx or IC755CxS06RDx

# 5.6 Battery Installation and Replacement

### **WARNING**






Figure 65: Battery Harness Connection IC755CxS06RDx





Figure 67: Battery Cover Removal IC755CxW07CDx










Figure 77: Example of Full-Duplex (RS-422 Mode) Connection

Figure 79: SD Card Location IC755CxS06RDx




Figure 80: SD Card Location IC755CxW07CDx





Figure 81: SD Card Location IC755CxSxxCDx



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# Section 6: Operation

# 6.1 Touchscreen Display

The QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Operator Interface features a LED Backlight LCD touchscreen display with two-point touch technology. The touch technology is based on projected capacitance that allows finger tracking without pressured contact. It is conducive to smooth scrolling and multi-touch gesturing capability. Display brightness and backlight operation can be configured using the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Setup tool available in the program system menu.

#### **ACAUTION**

Although Emerson recommends the use of the protective sheet, do not operate the touchscreen with any hard materials, such as a screwdriver. This could damage the touchscreen display.


**Note:** IC755CxS06RDx (6" display) is an Analog Resistive touch display that does not support two-point touch capability. Single point gestures such as swipe, pan, and double-tap are supported.

## 6.1.1 Display Brightness Adjustment

#### To adjust the brightness of the display

- Open the QuickPanel\* Setup Tool and select the Backlight tab to display the Backlight Display Properties window.
- 2. Set the backlight brightness value.

#### **Figure 82: Adjust Display Brightness**





#### 6.1.3 Touchscreen Recalibration

The QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> touchscreen is shipped pre-calibrated. However, if there are any issues with touchscreen responsiveness, it may need to be recalibrated.


To recalibrate the touchscreen

- 1. Open the **QuickPanel**\* **Setup** tool.
- 2. Select the **TouchPanel** tab.
- 3. Select Recalibrate Touch Screen.
- 4. Select Recalibrate Touch Sensor.

**Note:** During IC755CxS06RDx or IC755CxW07CDx touchscreen sensor re-calibration, the user is prompted to activate a switch located in the battery compartment. This does not apply to any other display units.

5. Remove the battery cover and press the switch shown in Figure 84.

# **6.2** Keyboard Configuration

The QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Operator Interface can be configured to use either or both a hardware keyboard and a software emulation keyboard as operator data input devices. Typically, an optional external hardware keyboard is used when in development mode, while the included Soft Input Panel (SIP) is more applicable in an operational environment.

# 6.2.1 External Keyboard (Optional)

Any USB-compatible keyboard may be used as an input device for the unit. The USB driver for the keyboard is included with the operating system and no configuration is required. To use an external keyboard, connect the keyboard to the unit using the USB cable.

#### 6.2.2 Soft Input Panel

The Soft Input Panel (SIP) is a touchscreen keyboard that may be used in place of a standard hardware keyboard. An icon in the system tray enables the user to view or hide the SIP.

#### To show or hide the SIP:

• from the system tray located on the taskbar, tap the icon and select Hide Input Panel.

**Note:** When visible, the SIP can be moved around the screen by dragging the title bar to reveal parts of the screen that would be obstructed from view by the SIP.

#### 6.3 Mouse

Any USB-compatible mouse may be used as an input device for the unit. The USB driver for the mouse is included with the operating system and no configuration is required. To use an external mouse, plug it into the appropriate port.

## 6.4 Printing

#### **WARNING**

USB-connected printers will violate the electrical compliance ratings. They can only be used for maintenance and are not supported as a standard service.

The QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Operator Interface supports printing with PCL v5 compatible laser and inkjet printers. The printer can be connected by either USB (on models with USB ports) or by a network shared printer over Ethernet. The control panel applet Printers is used to configure the port connection and other general printing options.

For the fastest printing performance, select draft mode and portrait orientation, and disable color for print settings. These settings also minimize the amount of memory needed to print a document.

The built-in driver has a document spooling function to improve GUI performance. This spooler supports only one document at a time. However, on an Ethernet-connected printer, the print server usually supports multiple documents in its queue. Windows Embedded Compact 7 does not support the ability to observe which documents are queued up at the printer.

For a list of printers that are compatible with that QuickPanel<sup>†</sup> Operator Interface, refer to the document Third-Party Device Compatibility (KB8259).

# 6.5 Memory

## 6.5.1 DRAM Memory

The QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Operator Interface is equipped with Dynamic RAM (DRAM). Part of the DRAM is reserved for the Windows operating system and is not accessible by user applications. The remaining memory is split between two functions: an object store for temporary file storage and the main memory for running programs.

Typically, compressed programs stored in flash memory are expanded and moved to DRAM for execution. The temporary storage of program variables or data files is also provided by DRAM. Any data stored in DRAM is not retained through a power cycle or restart.

The split between program memory and storage memory can be adjusted as necessary to make more room for one or the other, depending on specific application needs. For example, if an application is short of memory, alter the DRAM memory allocation from the System Properties window.

#### **A** CAUTION

Setting the Program Memory too low may prevent additional applications from starting, or may cause currently running applications to fail due to lack of memory.

Setting the Storage Memory too low may prevent the saving of files into the object store portion of the file system, which may also cause application failures.

For the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> 6" display unit, setting the Storage Memory too high or to an extreme limit may cause the device to become unresponsive. The device may be unable to launch any applications or windows and it may also require a power cycle. It is recommended that the Storage Memory be set to a valid limit.

#### 6.5.2 Memory Allocation Modification

#### To change the memory allocation

- 1. From the Control Panel, double-tap **System** to display the System Properties window.
- 2. From the **Memory** tab, drag the slider bar to divide into Storage and Program memory. The amount of memory allocated to and used by each area is displayed in the window. The blue slider bar indicates the current amount of unallocated SDRAM and determines the boundaries within which the slider can move.

**Note:** Storage memory is limited to a maximum of 128 MB. Using the slide bar to increase storage memory will provide more RAM-based storage in the folder \Object Store.

- 3. Tap **OK** to apply the new setting.
- 4. Run the Backup Utility to save the settings.


Secomea SiteManager software (also known as the Secomea Configuration tool) is installed on QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> products. The Secomea Configuration tool enables the user to configure and enable the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> device on the Secomea network.

**Note:** It is recommended that you have a Network Architect on-site and be working with the Secomea team to enable this functionality.

# To access the Secomea Configuration tool and enable the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> on the Secomea network

- 1. From the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> Start menu, select Programs to display the Secomea Configuration tool window.
- 2. Enable the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> device on the Secomea network.

Note:

The Appliance Name can be any name but should be unique so that the Secomea network can identify the device. Proxy Address allows the user to connect from their local network with firewall enabled and blocking ports 80, 443, and 11444. The SiteManager will attempt to establish a connection with and without proxy.

#### 7.2 Secomea Products

**Note:** Activation and deployment of the Secomea product features are optional. SiteManager, GateManager, and LinkManager products are licensed, sold, and supported by Secomea and Secomea's licensed distributors. QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> customers wanting to activate licenses for Secomea products can do so at www.secomea.com.

The available Secomea SiteManager (embedded on QuickPanel<sup>+</sup>), GateManager, and LinkManager products are described as follows:

**SiteManager** is a device-monitoring front-end feature for multiple industrial devices on a location. Working with GateManager and LinkManager ensures uninterrupted and secure access to remote devices over the Internet or a private Wide-area Network (WAN) for all users.

**LinkManager** is an off-the-shelf software component in Remote Device Management Solutions from Secomea that provides security for external programming and monitoring applications. **LinkManager Mobile** provides similar functionality for mobile devices.

**GateManager** is the central component of Secomea's Industry solution. The GateManager M2M Server operates as a termination point for all LinkManagers and SiteManagers. All connections and the encrypted traffic between LinkManagers and devices controlled by SiteManagers are handled by the GateManager, where all events are also logged.

Note:


The GateManager is typically offered as a service hosted by Secomea. Users will receive an isolated domain on the GateManager and benefit from central hosting and backup by Secomea. Or, the user can host their own GateManager.

Additionally, other devices such as PLCs and PCs (in addition to the QuickPanel<sup>+</sup>) can be added as new agents on the Secomea network to be part of Secured Communication using the Add Agents feature in the SiteManager GUI. This can be achieved using an extended license feature from Secomea.

Note:

Secomea products installed throughout the application as suggested in Figure 87 do not intrinsically provide the level of security associated with firewalls. The network architect needs to satisfy himself or herself that the security level required by the application is present in the overall implementation.

Figure 87: Secomea Products used with QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> in Application



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
# Section 8: Save and Restore Settings

Save and Restore Settings enables the device to store the settings of certain parameters of QuickPanel<sup>†</sup> to a file (the extension assigned to this file type is .qps) and then apply/restore the saved settings to the same QuickPanel<sup>†</sup> or any other QuickPanel<sup>†</sup> from the saved .qps file, whenever required.

#### 8.1 Menu Item Location

The menu item for launching the feature is present in the System menu.

The Save and Restore Settings feature box has two associated tabs:

- 1. Settings
- 2. Registry

**Settings Tab** – This tab has the different names of different settings that the user can select to save the settings value to the file.

#### Note:

- 1. The settings tab of the Save and Restore Settings dialog is not used for setting the values for any device parameters. It is only used to make the selection of the parameter settings, that the user wants wishes to a file.
- 2. The feature supports saving and restoring static IP addresses.

**Registry Tab** – This tab provides the option to the user to update values to keys in the device registry and save these records to the file so that the stored values can be restored to the corresponding keys, on the same QuickPanel<sup>+</sup> at a later time, or, if needed, also on a different QuickPanel<sup>+</sup>.

Figure 89: QP<sup>+</sup> Save Settings Settings tab






Figure 90: QP<sup>+</sup> Save Settings Registry Tab




To update the value to a registry key click on the Add button (Figure 90). This displays a dialog (Figure 91) to enter the values for Key Path, Name, Type, and value. Figure 92: Registry List Display




# 8.2 Import Registry Data from XML File

Figure 94: Import XML Feature





# 8.4 Restore the Settings from a (.qps) File

- 2. Click on the **Restore** button, and select **Yes** when prompted for confirmation.

**Figure 97: Restore Function** 






Figure 98: Browse to and Select .qps File





Figure 101: Connect the USB cable to QuickPanel\*





Figure 103: Adjust Retaining Clamp





Figure 104: Attach USB Retaining Clamp Plate




